metres, and a good deal of harm was also done to the others. All the same we managed to get some samples of interesting deep-sea forms, though such catches were of a more or less fortuitous nature.

Off Lisbon the sea became calm, and we took hydrographical observations at Station 17, obtaining water-samples from many

depths. Here, out on the edge of the continental slope, and in the Spanish Bay, the weather was beautifully warm, and the sun shone brightly. We with now met some extremely interesting forms of animal life. dol-Numerous phins swam round our bows. and when standing in the fore part of the ship we saw thousands of small pelagic crabs (Polybius; Fig. see 46), sometimes as many as fifty of them in three ) We minutes. also sighted a turtle.




FIG. 44.—BARGAINING.
