species. In Chatoderma nitidulum, Lovén, the calcareous needles, for instance, on the hind end of the body are, according to Greeff's report (Anatomie des Chætoderma nitidulum, Lovén, Zeitschr. f. wiss. Zool., Bd. xxvi. Taf. xiii. figs. 24-26), also flattened, but they are not elliptical in cross-section, like those of Chætoderma militare. And again, the spicules on the body of the latter are much less numerous, and we cannot doubt that the examination of fresh or well-preserved specimens of the tropical form would reveal other differences, which, with the material before me, I am unable to detect.
