jointed; it is also figured as possessing the unusual feature of being furnished with hairs both on the inner and outer margins. The other branch is two-jointed, the first joint probably representing the terminal joints of the peduncle; the second, that of the flagellum, is tipped with four or five long hairs.

The oral appendages and gnathopoda bear the same characteristic features as are

shown in the preceding figure.




Fig. 45 (E).—Zoea of Sergestes tenuis. From a drawing by Dr. v. Willemoes-Suhm; p5, five pairs of perciopoda.

The pereiopoda have now increased to five biramose pairs, of which the first is the largest and the last the smallest.
